Course Objectives

- 1. Determine character objectives and motivation based on text/script analysis and imagination exercises.
- 2. Demonstrate character objectives and motivation through performance choices based on text/script analysis.
- 3. Demonstrate listening skills based on behaving truthfully in the imaginary circumstance through performance choices.
- 4. Demonstrate objectives and emotional expression using deliberate vocal performance choices.
- 5. Demonstrate objectives and emotional expression using deliberate body language performance choices.
- 6. Demonstrate dynamics between characters using proximity and other deliberate non-verbal blocking and staging performance choices.
- 7. Demonstrate setting the scene and enhancing the dramatic tension and plot by using deliberate non-verbal blocking and staging performance choices.
- 8. Practice memorization by executing memorized script performances.
- 9. Practice performance evaluation by partaking in the discussion and directorial process guided by the instructor.
