Rationale: When this course was last offered (SPSU23), instructors spent between 8 and 15 hours each day (over 3 weeks) accompanying students during travel, site visits, and supervising fieldwork. While the lecture hours (15) are acceptable, the contact hours need to be increased to reflect the realities of chaperoning students on International Travel. Additionally, pre-requisites need to be added to this course to ensure that students have the academic foundation necessary to undertake fieldwork successfully.

Proposed Start Semester: Spring/Summer 2025

Course Description: In this course, students will focus on a particular sub-field of Anthropology (cultural, archaeology, bioarchaeology, primatology) at an international location that will involve both classroom and hands-on learning opportunities. The classroom component of the course will involve 1-2 weeks of lecture and/or labs before travel commences. Rationale: This course already exists as a highly successful Special Topics Course (ANT 164). It was offered in SP/SU 2014-2016 as a study abroad course in Peru and in SP/SU 2017 and 2019 as a combined ANT/HST course in the UK. Since 2017, this course has been part of an interdisciplinary study abroad experience with HST 290 (currently HST 164, taught by Ian Rush). Due to the success of these courses and our desire to offer the joint ANT/HST course every two years, we would like to make them permanent WCC courses. Additionally, we have intentionally broadened these courses from their previous narrow focus on Peru and the UK so that we might be able to take students to various locations around the globe.

Proposed Start Semester: Spring/Summer 2021

Course Description: This course will offer students the opportunity to study anthropology abroad. Students will focus on a particular sub-field of Anthropology (cultural, archaeology, bioarchaeology, primatology) at an international location and will involve both classroom and hands-on learning opportunities. The classroom component of the course will involve 1-2 weeks of lecture and/or labs before travel commences. The hands-on component of the course will involve travel abroad that includes cultural immersion, visits to relevant museums and landmarks, and hands-on participation at a fieldwork site. The course will be offered either as a stand alone Anthropology course or in conjunction with HST 290.
