Consultation with all departments affected by this course is required.

Rationale: Change GRM 109 to GRM 101. This class currently meets only two hours once a week resulting in high student frustration because of lack of practice and lack of retention from the previous week. Moreover, to achieve meaningful outcomes, it is necessary to meet more often with an instructor. Also, the FL109/110 dual course format has proven problematic in the classroom: teaching two distinctly separate levels in the classroom is essentially the same as attempting to teach FL 111 and 122 in the same classroom. Finally,community colleges nationwide offer beginning conversational German as a three or four credit course.

Proposed Start Semester: Spring/Summer 2012

Course Description: In this course, students acquire elementary conversational skills and develop the ability to understand, speak, react, and reflect using everyday conversational German. Through the introduction of vocabulary, grammatical structures, idioms, and real-life dramatization, the students practice these skills. Listening activities and some reading/writing activities will be included. Students are expected to spend considerable time outside of class practicing with materials provided. This course contains material previously taught in GRM 109.
